## **Overview**



- What is CareerSpark?
  - Free classroom and event-based learning experience to introduce 8<sup>th</sup> grade students to the working world and now high school students to jobs and internships
  - Virtual and/or in-person
  - CareerSpark-You're Hired! high school virtual experience
- What is JA Inspire?
  - Learning experience designed to wrap around a career expo
  - Helps make a career expo more than a field trip ensure students are prepared ahead of time and have action steps afterwards
  - Free career assessment for schools needing one that also complements Xello well





## **Background**



- Partner organization: Greater Peoria Economic Development Council
- First year of implementation: Fall 2017
  - 1,342 8<sup>th</sup> grade Students & 16 Schools
- Fall 2022
  - 3,890 8<sup>th</sup> grade Students & 64 Schools
- Transitioned to virtual learning experience Fall 2020
- Expansion to serve high school students & educators







## **Objectives**

- Help prepare 8<sup>th</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> grade students for successful futures
- Help educators meet PaCE Framework objectives for grades 8-12
- Help employers promote high growth, high demand careers in the region
- Obtain student impact-centered measurable outcomes to demonstrate program effectiveness
- Long term goal: potential longitudinal study

#### 8th Grade Educator Survey Outcomes Fall 2022



98% of educators

agreed the program increased student knowledge of career opportunities and pathways











CareerSpark/JA Inspire increased LMI-student interest in STEM careers and helped LMI students decide a career more than students in aggregate.

#### **Best Practices & Lessons Learned**



- Make friends with your Regional Office of Education (ROE)
- When planning virtual student participation, expect to have much lower student number than registered
- Don't underestimate the power of paper sometimes 'old school' printed paper workbooks, worksheets are most effective & help reduce barriers of the digital divide
- For in person career expos focus on experiential, hands-on activities – not tables w/ brochures
- Plan with DEI and Accessibility in mind do a DEI and Accessibility check
